The Artists

Connecticut Magazine calls soprano Katie Nicole Weiser "Golden Voiced." Originally from Litchfield, CT, Miss Weiser is pursuing her Masters degree in vocal performance at the Setnor School of Music where she studies with voice teacher, Janet Brown, and coaches with John Kolody in New York City. She received her B.A. in music from Smith College where she was the first vocalist to be awarded the Concentration in Performance. Miss Weiser began her classical music education at age seven when she joined the semiprofessional children's choir, Chorus Angelicus. She has also trained in musical theatre and appeared in the main stage productions at TriArts Sharon Playhouse since 2000 and has won two awards for "the best featured actress in a musical" from Seven Angels Theatre. In March 2009, she was awarded the Burton O. Cowgill award from the New England Music Festival for receiving the highest score in the festival adjudications all four years. She won first place twice in the NATS advanced high school division competitions. While at Smith College, she studied voice with Herb Burtis, won the Smith Concerto Competition, attended the Bel Canto Institute in Italy for opera, performed as Suor Genovieffa in Puccini's Suor Angelica, and appeared as a guest soloist with the NYC Ballet. She also represented Smith College in the documentary, "Women of Promise." Since coming to Syracuse, Miss Weiser has been a guest soloist with CNY's Premier Wind Ensemble ("Central Winds"), attended OperaWorks' Winter Intensive Opera Program in L.A., won the University's Aria and Concerto Competition, played Lucy in Menotti's opera, The Telephone, performed at Lincoln Center under Eric Whitacre, and performed opera improvisation at the National Opera Center in NYC. She also appeared as Cosette in Les Misérables at TriArts and studied with Dorit Hanak at AIMS in Graz, Austria. Upon graduation, Miss Weiser will return to Austria to perform as a soloist with the orchestra, Musikkapelle Södingtal. www.KatieNicoleWeiser.com

Robbie Padilla is a pianist who performs throughout upstate New York. Aside from his solo performances, he collaborates with a wide diversity of performers. Mr. Padilla is currently the organist at First Presbyterian Church of Chittenango and a graduate teaching assistant at Syracuse University. Aside from performing experience, Mr. Padilla currently teaches class piano at Syracuse University and piano privately. Before coming to Syracuse, he taught vocal, instrumental, and general music at Newfane Central School as a long-term substitute. Mr. Padilla has led choir, band, and orchestra rehearsals for many different groups. Mr. Padilla is currently studying piano with Ida Trebicka at Syracuse University where he will earn his M.M. in piano performance. He earned his B.M. in music education from SUNY Fredonia. After earning his Master's he sees many career paths in the field of music including teaching piano at a university or any form of music in a public school.
